New Compressors: Worth the Long Wait

Twin Cities Meals on Wheels continued to celebrate its 50th year with a "cool" donation. Funding for two new compressors for the freezer and cooler that were installed on June 14 was made possible through a grant from the 214 Foundation, Inc., thanks to the hard work and determination of board vice president Denise Sawatzky.

The compressors were purchased and installed by Singer Kittredge Restaurant Supply Co. of Tonawanda.

Jim Burke, chairman of the TCMOW board and his grandson, Andrew, along with other volunteers started the project by moving items in the refrigerator and freezer and cleaning off the top of the old compressors.

"While cleaning off the dust, we found installation instructions that dated back to 1990 proving that the compressors were long overdue for replacement," Jim said. The compressors will serve both the freezer and cooler.

"Thanks to Foundation 214, Inc., a family funded Foundation for donating the money for the compressors," Pam Hill coordinator, said.

"Foundation 214 is engaged in serving veterans of the U.S. Military, children and elderly in healthcare and education within the eight counties of Western New York," Debbie Sawatzky, said. "We are very grateful for their help with this needed project."


